

SERMON FOR TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY

Jesus came to Earth to answer two questions: The first is “Who is God”? The second is “What does God want”? Jesus answers the first question by revealing God as Loving, Kind and Merciful. To prove this Jesus did a lot of healing miracles and forgave a lot of sins. People took notice. Many became His followers. I would want to be good friends with someone who could make my life better. I could be very attracted to Jesus who said God is not out to punish me.

But His answer to the second question, “What does God want?” got Jesus in trouble. Jesus said God wants you to eat my flesh and drink my blood to have eternal life. The followers responded by saying “This saying is hard; who can accept it?” They showed their disdain by leaving Jesus and going home.

One of the saddest and most frustrating experiences I have as a priest is to see good people leave their faith in the face of hardships. When they most need God, they walk away from God. I experienced this too many times as a Chaplain at Children’s Hospital. Faced with the unfairness of a child seriously ill, some parents walked away from God, thinking He doesn’t care or worse, blaming Him for the illness. The devil has only one purpose – to separate God’s children from God. Nothing makes the devil happier than this. I think one of the greatest rewards in Heaven will be given to those who remain faithful to God when everything in their life told them to just leave God with disdain.

What does it mean to be faithful to God? A faithful person believes that God is in control of my life because He cares for me at all times, good and bad. The goal of faithfulness is to allow God to walk on my stormy waters and invite Him into my sinking boat. I believe God will never allow my boat to sink.

My friend Ruth was so faithful to God. She had many reasons not to be. Her whole life was one hardship after another. She was an orphan abandoned by her parents. Her husband abandoned her after giving birth to their son. She was a single mother working hard to raise him and feed him. Sadly, he passed away at a young age. I met Ruth living alone, her body filled with arthritis from her years of hard work cleaning rich people’s homes. She was homebound, unable to attend Church. I would very gently hold her gnarled hand out of fear a bone would break. Into that hand I would place the Body of Christ.

On my last visit before my ordination she gave me a gift. She told me, “God has been so good to me.” I was shocked to hear her say that. She continued, “With every cross God gave me a blessing. You have to look for them but they’re there. I’ve carried many crosses so God has given many blessings. When you are a priest, tell the people to keep faith and never lose hope.” She handed me a box. Inside was a banner she made for my ordination. What a precious gift made even more so when I thought of the pain her hands endured while making it. This gift I have hid so well I can’t find it to show you. It depicts a road that leads to the Cross. She placed flowers along the path. She told me, “On the road of life the flowers are the blessings. They make the Cross more bearable.” Shortly after my ordination Ruth went to Heaven. Her Cross is no more. Only the flowers of blessings surround her. Well done good and faithful servant.
